ISSUE

How are the 2023-204 Main Estimates supporting housing in Canada?

RESPONSE

- Mr. Speaker, I'm pleased to be here to outline the Government of Canada's priorities for housing, supported by the Main Estimates.
- Recent federal budgets announced initiatives that approach the problem of housing affordability from every possible angle. That's what drives the more than \$5.1 billion in Main Estimates that we're discussing today.
- Funding in these Estimates support several programs of the National Housing Strategy such as repairs and new construction under the National Housing Co-investment Fund, innovative solutions with the Housing Supply Challenge and deep affordable units.
- Mr. Speaker, we are nearly halfway through the strategy's timeline and we are on track on a number of its measures. We have committed nearly 50 percent of the strategy's funding. With that funding, we have reached or exceeded 50 percent of most of its targets.

Program	Increase or decrease from previous year	Justification
Canada Community Housing Initiative (FPT initiative)	Increase of \$84.8 Million	Funding profile is higher year over year for Canada Community Housing Initiative as per program design (22-23: 511M\$, 23-24: 595M\$, 24-25: 725M\$).
Canada Housing Benefit	Increase of \$56.0 Million	Canada Housing Benefit funding profile is increasing over the program horizon (22-23: 177M\$, 23-24: 224M\$, 24-25: 261M\$. Additionally, there was reprofiles in 21-22 and 22-23 impacting current year (23-24) by \$9M higher
Rapid Housing Initiative 1 and 2	Decrease of \$39.0 Million	RHI 2 Program ending March 31, 2022, reprofile for 31M\$ (22/23) in supps A.
Rapid Housing Initiative 3	Increase of \$501.1 Million	RHI 3 was announce as part of Budget 2022 with budget of 442M in 22-23 and 901M in 23-24.
Housing Supply Challenge	Increase of \$42.0 Million	A reprofile done in prior years moved funding from 20/21, 21/22 and 22/23 to the later year. The delay was caused by the federal election
Social Housing Agreement (SHA)	Decrease of \$79.0 Million	The decrease is consistent with previous years (~\$75M /year) and is expected to continue decreasing as programs reach their end.
One-Time Payment	Decrease of \$1,063.0 Million	The One-Time payment CHB was only in 22-23. In 23-24, the only funding left are for admin costs.
RCFi	Increase of \$42.1 Million	Higher volumes were projected in 23/24 vs 22/23 (40M). Multiple reprofile in the last five years increase budget for 22/23 by 59M and 23/24 by 62.5M due to time lapse between loan application and construction advancement.
NHCF	Increase of \$58.5 Million	The program was designed to have higher funding in the second half (23/24 was higher by 166M from 22/23), This program had multiple reprofile (reverse reprofile to accelerate repair and construction and normal reprofile during pandemic due to project delivery taking longer).

CECRA for small businesses	Decrease of \$8.0 Million	No budget in upcoming Mains, small reprofile of 8M in prior year Supps A to look into if funding was spent properly by landlords.
Granville Island	Decrease of \$15.0 Million	\$15M Supps A funding in previous year for COVID emergency relief funding, no such fund approved in current year
First Time Home Buyers Initiative/SEMP	Decrease of \$11.1 Million	Reflects new profile from Budget 2022 extension, mostly operating costs were higher in the first year by \$22M offset by higher interest expense in 23/24 by \$7M
Canada Greener home	Increase of \$121.4 Million	Stream 2 starting in 23/24 (increase by 76.6M). Stream 1 starting in 22/23 has higher funding in 23/24 (higher by 33M) since it is projected that more interest will need to be paid as more loans will be funded by the 2nd year of the program.
